

Westborough Deaths through 1802 (Alpha)
from the
Published Vital Records and the Diaries of Ebenezer and Breck Parkman

This table of deaths in Westborough, arranged alphabetically by last name, is derived principally from four sources: the published vital records of Westborough and Northborough (the latter through June 24, 1766, when the Second Precinct of Westborough was made the District of Northborough) and the diaries of Ebenezer Parkman and his son, Breck Parkman, the last extant year of which is 1802.¹

A few deaths were recorded in other sources. The *Independent Chronicle*, Dec. 20, 1782, reported Mitty Bond's death. Breck Parkman recorded Dolly Clews's burial (Apr. 13, 1794), while the *Columbian Centinel* reported the death of Dolly Clowes (Apr. 23, 1794). Joseph Woods probably died in 1757; his estate was probated in September of that year. Thaddeus Gale probably died in early 1756, the year when his estate was probated.

The published vital records are incomplete. Anyone working with such records is certainly aware of their limitations, especially the fact that deaths are generally most underrepresented. The diaries of Ebenezer Parkman and, to a lesser extent, Breck Parkman provide invaluable additional information not merely about the fact of a death but sometimes also the cause of death – information that is largely absent from the eighteenth-century portion of the published vital records.² For example, in the case of deaths in 1756, the vital records contain thirty, to which Ebenezer Parkman's diary adds twenty-six. That year was one of unusually high mortality, as were 1745-1746 and 1756.

Why were deaths underreported? In attempting to answer a question about something that did not happen, we can start with the record of Ebenezer Parkman's family. The death of Molly (Mary Champney) Parkman appears in the vital records. Hannah (Breck) Parkman, Ebenezer's second wife, suffered two miscarriages, the first of which, apparently early in her first pregnancy, received little attention from her husband: "Late home and Cold. My wife had a very ill turn, and had been very ill for Two Dayes. Keeps her Chamber. Abort,³ etc., etc." (Feb. 20, 1738). The next day, "My wife keeps Chamber," and a week later, "My Spouse first got down stairs after her illness" (Feb. 28, 1738).

Hannah's second miscarriage, about five months into her second pregnancy, prompted a fuller description. Not only did Parkman note that Hannah "had gone but about 5 Months," but that she "was deliver'd of a tender, lifeless, Male Child, The Measure of which was 13 1/2 Inches long. Immature for Birth, Yet with all its parts perfect" (Dec. 25, 1739). The next day, Parkman prevailed upon Ebenezer Maynard to dig a grave "for the Stillborn, little Babe" and his brother-in-law John Hicks to make a coffin, "but did not colour it." That evening, at Parkman's request, Deacon Forbush buried "the Infant" (Dec. 26, 1739).

Parkman seemed more invested in, or at least more analytical about the second miscarriage, but, like the first, he did not report it to the town clerk. Does the fact that the coffin was not painted suggest something about a parent's perception of a stillborn? Whatever the case, Parkman was typical in not reporting miscarriages or stillbirths.

But what about his sixteen living children, all of whose births were reported? One, Elizabeth, died seventeen days after birth, and her death appears in the vital records. But the deaths of three older children were not officially recorded. Thirty-year-old Thomas died while in military service at Stillwater (Oct. 23, 1759);⁴ twenty-two-year-old John, who returned from Lancaster where he was settling, died at home after a protracted illness (Sept. 10, 1775); and nineteen-year-old Hannah also died at home after a protracted illness (Oct. 14, 1777). None of these deaths appear in the vital records.

Why did Parkman not report the deaths of these three children? Was it forgetfulness, or grief, or simply a detail that got lost in the busy life of a minister whose duties to his parishioners and responsibilities for his farm and family took precedence?⁵ Perhaps, too, there was a wider cultural attitude that led to the underreporting of deaths. Yes, a child, a spouse, or a parent had died, but that, in a fundamental way and even in the face of grief and mourning, was less important than the start of a new life or a marriage that joined two families and their economic futures.
