

# Stillbirths and Miscarriages in the Diaries of Ebenezer and Breck Parkman

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This table provides information about thirty-one stillbirths and miscarriages that are recorded in the diaries of Ebenezer Parkman and Breck Parkman<sup>1</sup> and in the Westborough vital records. (Only two stillbirths appear in the vital records, one of which was recorded in Ebenezer Parkman's diary.<sup>2</sup>)

Stillbirths appear to have been rarely noted in vital records. In towns near Westborough, there were none in Northborough; two recorded stillbirths in Southborough; two in Upton; two in Shrewsbury; seven in Hopkinton; and seven in Marlborough – most before the nineteenth century. By contrast, in Grafton, ten stillbirths were recorded in the 1840s.

Most of the stillbirths were unnamed, although in several cases parents did name the child: in Southborough, Nathan, the stillborn son of Nathan Bridges; in Upton, Huldah, the stillborn daughter of Thomas and Elisabeth Forbush; and in Shrewsbury, Appleton, the stillborn son of John and Abigail Richerson, and Benjamin, the stillborn son of Joshua and Sarah Smith.

I attend the Funeral to Day. Mrs. Haskill has been brought to bed; but the Child is dead. It was on the 26.
